On completion of dinner, Adrian Southwood proposed the Royal Toast whilst Taff Jones read out the twenty-six names of Ugborough's dead before raising a toast to their memory. Professor Dr Harry Bennett from the University of Plymouth gave a speech on the causes of WWI, the act of remembrance and the importance of passing experiences onto the younger generations. On completion, the Buglers of 4 The Rifles sounded retreat which rounded off the evening.

Community Herb Garden Merryl Docker

Most of you will now be aware that the Community Herb G arden has been successfully completed and was dedicated at the church service to honour all those affected by WW1 on Sunday 3rd August.

It was a lovely, moving service attended by members of the British Legion and the families of many of those whose lives were lost. Buglers from the 4th Rifles made the service very poignant indeed. Wreaths were laid by Parish Council Chairman George Beable and Commodore Francis Douglas and poppy crosses with the names of all the Ugborough men lost during the conflict were planted in the herb garden by descendants and children from the parish.


Special thanks go to the Monumental Service of Co-op Funeral Care for work freely given to restore the war memorial, George Long for building such a stunning garden, and Edd Johns for re creating the 'Door Step' seat: this has been made from the 'doorstep' given by the Anstiss family when their home (Laburnum Cottage in what is now Undertown) was demolished to make way for prefabs in 1953. This doorstep was always a place for village folk to meet and gossip. In the History Group archive we have photos of people sitting on the doorstep during the period of the First World War When the house was demolished, the family insisted on the step still being used by the village as a place to meet friends, sit a while and chat. It seems very appropriate exactly 100years on to make more of this seat and reposition it so everyone can enjoy the lovely open space below the War Memorial at the top of Ugborough Square. Thanks must also go to

Owen Davies for the fabulous poppy topped copper plant labels, Shelley Hutcheon for co-ordinating the planting and other members of the Johns family from Hillhead Farm for all their help and support and indeed everyone who helped in anyway, especially ClIrs George Beable and Tom Holway. Every plant has come from a garden in the village, if anyone has any herbs they wish to add to the garden please let me know \sim there is room for more. The garden, war memorial and seat all look far better than I could ever have imagined. So many local people gave their skills and time to this project, it is there for us all to enjoy, please visit the site, sit for a while and enjoy our lovely village and, once the herbs are established, take some home to enhance your cooking!



Beryl's Bookworms - Sue Johns

Our August Book was 'The Light Between Oceans' by M.L.Stedman. This debut novel is set in a small town in Western Australia, and on an island off the coast on which there is a



lighthouse, at the end of the WW1. The lighthouse keeper is a damaged war veteran and marries a local girl to live in self-imposed isolation on the island of Janus. The couple are desperate for a family after several miscarriages, and when a boat is washed ashore with a dead man and a tiny mewling baby on board the wife insists they keep the baby as a 'gift from God'. The novel continues with the consequences of moral deception and dilemma, as the real mother eventually learns about the child and her dead Austrian husband.

The reviews we discussed were all, without exception, glowing reports of the language, description, well drawn characters and the ensuing reflection on life, redemption, darkness and light, safety and danger.

Our consensus and subsequent animated discussion, largely begged to differ. Most felt that the story line was contrived, the characters weak, the language stilted and the description suspect! Some conceded however, that the tale was within the bounds of possibility, and that the portrayal of a woman desperate for children was very believable. Interviews with the author revealed that this tale had evolved from a short story which she had 'rolled and shaped' to produce the novel. This explained, what most agreed, as the unnecessary, 'padding'. The ending, set thirty years on endeavoured to tie up the loose ends - for those who like neat finality.

Surprisingly, despite our apparent derogatory discussion, we scored the book at a very average 2.75 out of 5. This because, as most agreed, that here was a light holiday read which despite its failings encouraged us all to complete it if not just to see where on earth it was going!! (Our July book, Harvest, by Jim Crace also stimulated a lot of discussion and different views. The average score was 3.5, but scores varied wildly between those who loved it and those who hated it!)

Your Stars Tonight. The steamed dietor and I are sitting in the darkened garden watching the full moon skittering through the clouds blown ragged by the aftermath of Hurricane Bertha. We are discussing what is worse - the sins of the parents visited upon the

children or vice versa - the sins of children on their parents. I am in expansive mood after sampling small quantities of medicinal organic ethanol and feel able to contribute to the debate using my limited knowledge of Grecian mythology. "Take Cassiopeia as an example of a bad parent" I slur, "Queen of Egypt, but a vain unpleasant woman, who so irritated Neptune down at the Camel and Ibis pub that he sent a serpent to ravage the local population". "And who was the luckless innocent child chained to a rock and left out as Serpent bait? Her daughter Andromeda - saved only by a passing itinerant waving a Gorgon's head".

With that I decide to locate Cassiopeia in the night sky above – it is easily identifiable high in the east as a "W" – albeit a slightly squashed "W" on its left hand side. The more argumentative Ugboronians (of which there are quite a few) might claim that it is an "M", slightly squashed on its right hand side. Notwithstanding it is a lovely constellation to view with binoculars or a telescope as it straddles the Milky Way and it glitters with faint stars. Just above the middle star of the "W" is a sinuous snake of faint stars going by the name of "Eddie's Coaster" – before I saw it I imagined it was a table mat but then it became clear that it was named after the American, Eddie Carpenter, who has an enthusiasm for fairgrounds. A pretty sight with binoculars.

Even more charming is the pattern of stars first described by the Canadian Franciscan priest and enthusiastic amateur astronomer Father Lucian Kemble. He died in 1999 but is remembered in "Kemble's Cascade". To find it take the distance between the top left and right stars of Cassiopeia's "W" and then follow the direction of these stars down towards the horizon for the same distance and you will find a long line of stars of varying magnitudes. Obviously with tens of thousands of stars visible the random alignment of three or four stars is to be expected but this group has around twenty in total - it is a most odd sight. In my more imaginative moments I fantasise that alien super beings have moved these distant stars into line in order to signal their presence to the rest of the nearby galaxy - although it perhaps more likely to be an advertisement for an intergalactic Lidl. Follow down to the end of the line and there is the faint scatter of stars making up the star cluster NGC 1502 looking like a celestial rock pool beneath a waterfall of stars.

And you have the added bonus of being in the lesser known constellation of Camelopardus - the Giraffe - not many people know that!

Your Sports Report intrepid reporter went behind the scenes at one of the most successful, yet mysteriously little known, Ugborough sporting clubs this month the cricket team. It was particularly tricky identifying anyone who wanted to be associated with this team and even in the dark corners of the Ship no-one had seen anything and we were unable to get someone to talk...except Adrian of course. In the end, an approach to the Mayor of Ugborough, Boris Holway, shed some light when he mentioned that he had seen some people in white dancing around a large wicket during a full moon. It was heartening, at the start of the August Parish Council Meeting, to hear about the success of the WW1 Commemorative herb garden and church service. The herb garden will be a lasting memorial which the community will appreciate – and use – for years to come. Thank you George Beable, Edd Johns, Tom Holway, George Long, Merryl Docker and everyone who helped to make it a reality. Also, many thanks to the Co-operative Funeral Service, who cleaned up the memorial – they did a great job. The total cost of the works was £295 over budget, and it is hoped that Devon County Council will donate this sum to such a successful project.

<u>Planning applications</u> No objections were raised to the proposed revised internal layout for the barn conversion at The Linhay, Haye Farm, Ludbrook, nor to the new dwelling and garage/office at Godwell House, Ivybridge. No objection was raised to the change of use from light industrial to residential at Whiteoaks, David Lane, Filham, although the proposed dwelling should be a similar height to the adjacent house. The Parish Council objected to the removal of a condition on the proposed new dwelling at Park Cottages on the grounds that the increased height would result in a loss of amenity to adjacent properties; and the original objections would be submitted on the appeal for the redevelopment of the former Woodpecker Inn site.

<u>Dartmoor National Park Authority</u> is offering two grants, and more information is available from <u>www.dartmoor.gov.uk/livingin/grants</u>. The 'Your Dartmoor Fund' is available to innovative projects which create a lasting positive change and help sustain the natural beauty, wildlife and cultural heritage of Dartmoor and help local communities and businesses to prosper. The Dartmoor Communities Fund has £36,000 available to community groups and Parish Councils to support capital projects which ensure the long-term viability of community facilities or provide new community infrastructure to meet community needs – such as a community shop or village hall facilities

<u>Wrangaton Post Office</u> is shutting down and the Dartmoor Communities Fund could be used for an alternative facility. The Post Office is looking for an alternative hosted solution at Wrangaton or Bittaford, and any suggestions would be most welcome.

<u>Our Plan</u>, which is being prepared by South Hams District Council, has just issued its options for development sites and is seeking feedback on the assessment. Have a look at <u>www.southhams.gov.uk/siteassessment</u> - the deadline for responses is the 12th September. <u>The Devon Waste Plan</u> is also consulting on its proposed modifications, and responses are invited by the 19th September - visit <u>www.devon.gov.uk/dwpmodifications</u>. <u>The e-seniors project</u> is moving forward, and it is proposed to hold sessions in the very well-equipped IT Suite at the Watermark, with a free Ring & Ride service. The aim is to provide a series of free internet and IT training sessions to enable our more senior members of the community to enjoy the benefits of going online. It is hoped to run the sessions in October and November and, if you are interested, please contact the Clerk, Sarah Woodman 01364 661127.

First Aid Training Courses may also be on offer, depending on demand.

St John Ambulance is offering training at £25 (+VAT) per person, and the Parish Council would fund hall hire. The training would last for 3 hours and include treatment for severe bleeding, choking, chest pains, unconscious casualty, resuscitation, communication & casualty care etc. A certificate of competence is awarded, which is valid for 3 years. The way you Register to Vote has Changed

The registration system changed on 10th June 2014. The new system is called 'Individual Electoral Registration'. Under the old system the 'head of every household' could register everyone who lived at their address. Under the new system everyone is responsible for registering themselves.

Electors in the South Hams District Council area were written to on 28^{th} July 2014 telling them whether they are on the new register or whether they need to take action. Most people who are already registered to vote will be registered automatically under the new system. **They do not need to do anything**. However, some people will need to take action to join the new register which will be published on 1^{st} December 2014.
