
# <u>Ugborough Local History Group-</u> Merryl Docker



# Beryl's Bookworms - Sue Johns

As ever lively discussion for this month's meeting for Augusts' book 'Old Filth' by Jane Gardam. The unlikely title of this novel, (Filth means 'Failed in London Try Hong Kong'), follows the life of a distinguished judge, from his childhood in Malaya to his old age in Dorset. Well written, the tale traversed back and forth in time ever working towards the truth of the unhappy childhood which shaped Old Filth's life. We all agreed that the characters were well drawn and that the story captured the essence of the Raj orphan debacle. However, whilst most felt the story touched a chord with its tragic, poignant yet sometimes comic rhetoric, a minority felt the entire story attempted to touch on too many unresolved issues, left too many cliff hangers and incorporated too many contrivances. Gardam's subsequent sequels following different characters from this novel will possibly satisfy the sceptics and thrill the converted...The overall scoring was 3.8 out of 5. September's Book will be Rose Tremain's Restoration.

Your Stars Tonight. "This puts the Ugborough Fair Concert in the shade," I chortle as I look at the programme for the Green Man Festival, "I fancy the Swans with their hard core, proto industrial rock soundscapes, followed by Darkstar who have made their mark on London's nascent grime and dubstep music scene". The steamed dietor winces and looks out of the camper van window and declaims "Black, black, black are the Black Mountains of Abergavenny and dark the clouds bearing rain". "And that reminds me of my star gazing search for Barnard 143 - the renowned dark interstellar cloud." I exclaim. With a sigh the steamed dietor opens the camper van door and points into the rain sodden gloom and indicates she wishes to be alone.

Edward Edmund Barnard - known to his fellow astronomers as "the man who never slept" - was obsessed by the black areas of the night sky where no stars are visible. Not for him the faint glow of distant galaxies, or soft light haze of star clusters, nor was he an enthusiast for the glowing gas clouds like Orion's nebula or the ethereal light from the remnants of exploded stars such as the Crab nebula. He was looking for really black black sky - as Zaphod Beeblebrox was later to enthuse about space ship upholstery. Eventually he catalogued 370 of these and showed they were enormous interstellar clouds of cold dust blocking out light from the stars beyond - they were dark nebula.

The largest of these is the Coal Sack dark nebula which is easily visible to the naked eye but unfortunately requires residence in the Antipodes and an Australian Visa. Star gazers closer to Ugborough need ocular magnification to see our biggest dark nebula - the afore mentioned Barnard 143 - also known as Barnard's E nebula for its distinct resemblance to the capital E. Finding it requires a honing of your celestial navigation skills.

Start by finding the "Summer Triangle" of bright stars made up by Vega, Deneb and Altair. Vega is currently almost directly overhead and by far the brightest star in the summer sky, Deneb is a little to the East (see if you can then see the kite like shape of fairly bright stars of the constellation Cygnus, the Swan). Altair is the bright star below them in the southern sky and forms a distinctive line with two other stars making up the wings of Aquila, the Eagle. This is where Barnard 143 resides. I have been trying to catch a glimpse of Barnard 143 for the last two years with no success - trying to see a black cloud against a background of night sky is difficult, particularly as my aging eyes seem to be perpetually clouded by black floaters and other optical noise. But on a moonless night in early August I turned the binoculars in that direction one more time - and there it was - no mistaking the E shape. It raised the question why I had never seen it before - as always with visual astronomy one never can be quite sure that what you are seeing is real - until you see it.

#### SPORTS REPORT - Janner Motson

What a thrilling summer of cricket Ugborough has seen. With crowds enjoying the sunshine and spectacle the village played a full season of 10 games, winning 5 and coming excitingly close in 3 of the others. There will be many contenders for the awards this year, but hotly tipped is Paul Stewart who scored over 200 runs and ended with a Bradman-esque average of more than 100 thanks to the retirement system employed in the T20 matches. Other contenders include Peter Williams and Dan Clayden for their tight bowling, but it was notable how this year's team were able to bowl sides out, getting the wickets needed to push games tight. However, the key difference could well be the excellent standard of fielding in most of the games, where the exploits of Andy MacMillan, Simon Weir and even John Parham provided many magic moments.

The team continues to look for the home talent and is active in its youth policy by including no less than 6 U15s in the ranks this year. The selectors will have a tough choice next season with some of the 'older' players due to come back from injury.....although it won't be long before they will be out again with their next pulled muscle.

Elsewhere, the football is looming and the Ugborough Football youth teams will be hoping to emulate their heroes from the Ugborough Legends squad. Following this year's near miss in the 6-a-side tournament President of the Legends, Steve Hughes, told SPORTS REPORT; "We showed that we can still score goals, sometimes even in the opposition net." When quizzed about management he said; "If a manager isn't fired with enthusiasm, he'll be fired with enthusiasm." - Fighting words from a management fighting for its life.

As there was no Newsletter in August, this report covers both the July Parish Council Meeting and the extra meeting in August (which is held only to consider planning applications and any other urgent matters).

Planning applications were the main discussion in both the July and August meetings, and the Parish Council comments (given in italics) were:

- Demolition of wooden bungalow at Moorside, Bittaford Ref 0327/13 Request that
  the orange plastic fencing, which has been in place for 2 years, be replaced with a
  more sympathetic enclosure
- Stowford Mill Planning Brief Links with Ivybridge Community College should be explored. A mixed office and residential use would be preferred. Any development should include a hydroelectric scheme
- Appeal against failure to notify of decision on Erection of single wind turbine (0.5megawatt) hub height 50m, tip height 79m and associated electrical structure and access improvements at Dunwell Farm, Ugborough Ref 57/0963/13/F Object. Potential conflict with the emerging Neighbourhood Plan, adverse effect on the landscape
- Householder application for the replacement of existing timber windows with pvc-u
  windows at Crofter's Court, Filham Ref 57/1609/13/F Prefer natural timber windows.
   Support a change of colour to white or pastel shades
- A wind energy development comprising of the erection, up to 25 years operation and subsequent decommissioning of 1 no. wind turbine (estimated output of 0.85megawatts) with 60 metres hub height, 86.5 metres tip height together with access tracks, temporary works, hardstanding areas, electricity substation and cabling and alterations to the existing vehicular access off the junction at Ley Green, at Land SX6170 5363 Luson Farm, Near Westlake Ref 21/1640/13/F No comment
- Full planning application for the extension of cricket club pavilion/clubhouse to create annexe for storage, garaging, and club facilities at Ivybridge Cricket Club, Filham Park, Godwell Lane, Ivybridge Ref 57/1654/13/F Support
- Retention of field shelter, commercial sand school, new track and associated works at land at Cheston, Wrangaton Ref 0365/13 Object. Inappropriate location for commercial use. Contrary to original planning permission
- Erection of barn (13m x 9m) at 1 Leigh Close, Bittaford Ref 0358/13 No objection

The Neighbourhood Plan has reached its next phase, with the findings of the questionnaire and the identification of options for the future. See the Newsletter Report from the Neighbourhood Plan Working Group - and come along to one of the roadshows!

Where you Live Following on from the very successful webpage at southhams.gov.uk, South Hams District Council is considering extended the service to businesses - feedback is requested on the services to be provided. Looking at the SHDC website, I note there is currently a consultation on the Council Tax Reduction Scheme, which has arisen as the Council's overall budget has been cut by Government - your comments are invited on a number of options.

The next Parish Council Meeting is to be held on Wednesday  $11^{th}$  September, and you are welcome to attend. Agenda and minutes are displayed on the Council's noticeboards and website.

# Ugborough Neighbourhood Plan

On 24<sup>th</sup> July Ugborough Parish Neighbourhood Planning Working Group (UPNPWG) met planning advisor Greg Davies of the Community Council of Devon to consider his report on the results from the Neighbourhood Planning questionnaire. The Group selected the following development proposals that had attracted sufficient support to warrant further research, investigation and consultation in the process of producing options for the Neighbourhood Plan.

- 1. Affordable Housing (8 homes)
- 2. Open Market Housing (maximum 25 homes additional to affordable by 2040)
- 3. Car Parking (may not just be a car park)
- 4. Community Shop
- 5. Pre-School Play Group facility
- 6. Public Open Space
- 7. Renewable energy policy (substantial opposition to wind farms and wind turbines)

Ideas which are shelved due to lack of support are; a multi-purpose community building to replace the village hall; the provision of office facilities; an hotel adjoining Wrangaton Golf Course (the hotel received majority support from residents in the Wrangaton, Bittaford and Moorhaven areas and this may be pursued by other means). The Report on the questionnaire and the Notes of the Meeting of 24<sup>th</sup> July 2013 are now available on the Parish Council website <a href="https://www.ugboroughparishcouncil.gov.uk">www.ugboroughparishcouncil.gov.uk</a> for your information.

The UPNPWG now propose to form five Focus Groups to consider viability, funding, location options and wider constraints and opportunities for these development possibilities. Expressions of interest are invited from members of the community with suitable skills to join the Focus Groups. Stakeholders may also be invited to participate. ## erme- Remind Lindsay Ward

Firstly, if you haven't heard, erme-Remind is the new name for Dementia Friendly Parishes Around the Erme. The name was the thought up by Diane Webley of Ermington Parish Council with Remind standing for Remembering Everyone Matters in Dementia (with 'erme' helping to distinguish our local identity). The name also sums up our aim which is to create a community where people living with dementia and their families feel included.

Achieving our aim will always be a work in progress but we hope to take the parishes involved some way on this vital journey. Our recent coffee morning at the White Hart helped us to take another step forward. The atmosphere was really good thanks to the range of people who gave up their time to attend, plenty of cake and some super raffle prizes thanks to Diane (as before), Judy Alloway from Kingston Parish Council and Nicholas Hair and Beauty.. Those in attendance included representatives from across the business community, education, health, the clergy, parish councils and a whole range of community groups. Special guests included Cllr Bryan Carson, the Chairman of South Hams District Council and Ian Sherriff from the Prime Minister's National Steering Group on the dementia challenge. Ian gave us an entertaining talk which helped to understand the seriousness of the challenge and yet the many positive things that can be achieved for the good of all.

As well as a fund raising raffle we used the coffee morning to pilot a questionnaire as part of an on-going survey to help in developing understanding of what good dementia friendly communities should be like and provide us with information that can help us take our parishes along this route. The first section of the questionnaire is designed for anyone to complete, whilst section two is for those living with dementia and section three is for carers and family members.

At the moment copies of the questionnaire can be obtained from the lead parish - Modbury Parish Council - with wider access developing over the coming months.

We keep researching, learning and making new contacts to help with this work and there are many more events and initiatives coming up this Autumn and Winter.

South Hams District Council, in partnership with not-for-profit organisation Wessex Home Improvement Loans, may be able to provide homeowners, park home owners and landlords with subsidised finance to carry out essential repair works to their homes. Works are assessed by the council and include boiler repair, replacement or heating installation, damp repair, structural works including roof/thatch repair, electrical and plumbing works, rotten windows replacement, or upgrades to bathrooms and kitchens over 15 years old and in need of repair. Eligibility is wide to include people who own their own homes who may have savings and/or an income but who wouldn't be able to afford repairs or access finance elsewhere. # St. Peter's Church, Ugborough

Dear friends.

I am looking forward to baptising four babies this coming weekend, having already baptised two adults and another baby two weeks ago. I believe that baptising people into the church is the start, hopefully, of a lifelong living commitment to follow Christ. It is therefore the beginning, rather than the end.

Many of our fonts are hundreds of years old, and must have been used to baptise so many over the years. The font at Halwell has no stopper in the bottom, and a large dish is placed in to hold the water. At Moreleigh the water flows out of the door when the water is released. In Ermington, this week, I met a gentleman who gave a presentation book to the Church with the names of those who had subscribed to Rev. Pinwell's leaving present, after he had served the parish for forty years, starting in 1880. The gentleman's father had carved the beautiful font cover in the Church, when he worked for the Pinwell sisters, renowned for their carving skills. The font at Diptford is striking for the noise it makes as the water is released!

Ugborough's font is interesting as it is cut out of sand stone, and just as the water flows out of a pool dug on a sandy beach, the water leaks out in St. Peter's. So, when I left the water in after baptising my last baby in the church, half of it had disappeared before the baptising of the two adults on the following day. The font had also changed colour with the water seeping through.

It seemed to me that the water wanted to be released into the world outside of the church. In Baptism, we all promise to be Christ's faithful soldiers and servants on active service in the world, bringing in others to be baptised in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, till the end of our lives. Some of us are often to be caught half asleep in our Christian lives. May God stir us up by His Spirit, in order to bring in others into God's Kingdom, so that in turn they may go out to live to his glory in the world. This is the duty of all the baptised.

So may the love of God sparkle in your eyes, as you meet others on their journey, and may your joy give glory to God in Jesus' name.
