<u>The Beacon Federation -</u> Executive Headteacher - Mrs. Jane Byrne Ugborough Primary School.

A message from Sue Roberts, Chair of Governors Proposed Federation with Manor Primary School

Mrs Byrne, our Executive Headteacher, has announced that she will be retiring at the end of the current school year in August after 16 years at Ermington and 8 years as head of Ugborough in our Beacon Federation. The Governors have been discussing in detail since December how best to ensure the continuing success of both schools from next September. Having examined all the options available we concluded that the best way forward would be to expand the Beacon Federation by linking with another local school and we have therefore been in discussion with Manor Primary, Ivybridge. Both Governing Boards have reached a preliminary agreement to explore this option in detail so we are now in the consultation period which runs until 29th April.

If you have any comments or queries about this proposal, please do not hesitate to contact the school as we really need to know what you think. Copies of the relevant documents are on the federation website.

Ivybridge U3A - Jean Sherrell

The April General Meeting of Ivybridge U3A will be held on Monday 15th April at 2 p.m. in the Watermark. **The subject of our Speaker Nick Townsend will be "Born Free, A Serengeti Childhood"**

Nick Townsend was born in East Africa in the early 50s and spent most of his childhood in Masailand, Northern Tanzania. Nick will be describing his and his family's encounters with wildlife in their home, garden and on safari. Lions and leopards, snakes, buffalo and elephants were part of their daily life. The wildlife in Masailand was abundant, with many of the great game parks of not just Tanzania but the whole of Africa lying within or on its boundaries: the Serengeti, Ngorongoro, Lake Manyara, and Tarangire. Then there were the truly wild and remote places such as Lake Natron and Ol Doinya Lengai (the Masai's Mountain of God). Nick will be illustrating his talk with photos taken by his father in the 50s and early 60s supplemented by a few of his own from when he returned in 1973 and 2000. For details about lyybridge U3A





Rainfall at Shellwood Hill George Arnison

February was notable for having the two warmest winter days ever recorded in the UK (and first time 20 degrees C has been exceeded in winter) and for being the second sunniest. I don't know that we broke any records down here, but we certainly had a lovely dry and warm spell, and the 93.5mm (3 3/4") of rain that I recorded at Shellwood Hill was below the 115mm average for the last ten years. March has not started quite so well.





Beryl's Bookworms – Sharon Hughes

This month's book was 'I am I am I am' by Maggie O' Farrell.

This is a unique memoir, told through 17 accounts of near death experiences with each chapter headed by the name of a body part.



These include debilitating childhood illnesses of O'Farrell's and her daughter's, several brushes with death in the water and some scary close encounters with menacing strangers.

Although we know O'Farrell survives each one it is the 'what could have been' factor that is chilling and breathtaking.

One of these incidents happens on a remote pathway where her instinct tells her the man she meets has evil intent. O'Farrell manages to escape but shortly after hears he murders someone on the same pathway.

The writing is certainly descriptive and most people found it evocative and compelling although one or two considered it self- indulgent and too flowery with an overuse of similes and metaphors.

The divided opinion of course created a lively discussion with friendly banter!

Everyone was interested to hear people's own stories about near misses and some felt these were more enjoyable than the book!

The book scored just over 4/5 and it was only the very small minority of dissenters that lowered this score from a resounding 4.5.

It is perhaps a 'Marmite book' you love it or you hate it!

Next month's book is 'The Tattooist of Auschwitz' by Heather Morris.

The March Parish Council Meeting was held a week later than normal to accommodate your Clerk's holiday plans. She returned with a dislocated shoulder and is finding typing a real trial – so this report will be quite brief!

Inconsiderate parking along Fore Street was highlighted during the public session. Apart from being against the law and unnecessary, it is very inconsiderate to pedestrians, particularly those with young children or pushing buggies.

Wrangaton was the focus of discussion on two fronts: Further discussions will be held with Dartmoor National Park about its recognition as a 'settlement'; and an on-site meeting discussed parking arrangements – DCC Highways will be drawing up plans to extend the double yellow lines and to permit parking on the Green Lane splay

Planning applications considered at the Meeting (with recommendations in **bold**):

- Householder application for extension to dwelling at Lower Barn, Coarsewell, Ugborough Ref 0474/19/HHO Object. Substantial extension to the footprint of the original barn. Development has a significant impact on the character of the barn
- Erection of 5 dwellings and associated parking at vacant land South of Coach House, Wrangaton Ref 0722/19/FUL Object. Not compatible with the Neighbourhood Plan or the emerging Joint Local Plan

Burial ground fees have increased again to bring them in line with those charged by Ivybridge, and a full list is given on the Parish Council website.

Parish Council elections are due to be held on the 2^{nd} May. Although most of the Parish Councillors are happy to stand again, it is likely that there will be one or two vacancies. If you are interested in becoming a Parish Councillor, you must submit your nomination paper by 3^{rd} April – look out for the public notices. Training is available to all new Parish Councillors.

Grant funding has been made available for a number of local projects, including repairs to Ugborough Village Hall, History Group funding towards an interpretation board for the community herb garden and repairs to the Donkey Lane tap, a defibrillator for Wrangaton phone box, and Preschool funding towards plan preparation.

An environmental campaign is being run by the Kingsbridge & Salcombe Gazette to '...make the South Hams one of the most environmentally friendly Districts in the country'. A letter from our Rector- Rev'd David Sayle

A Message for Holy Week and Easter

On Palm Sunday, we enter the story of Holy Week and Easter yet again. The familiar story that we hear year after year is a story to which we know the ending - after a happy beginning things go downhill. There's betrayal, sadness, death and destruction and then the ending to beat all endings when the hero reappears having defeated death and surprises all his friends. The problem I guess that many of us have is that because we know the ending, we lose sight of the anticipation and excitement of the story. It's not that the plot is predictable or easy to anticipate - for us it's the problem of hindsight.

We know that Palm Sunday's jubilation was followed by the despair of Good Friday. We know that the seeming failure of Good Friday was quickly overtaken by the triumph of the first Easter Day. Hindsight is supposed to be beneficial - but in the case of the Easter story it robs us of the possibility of living through the events as they happened.

What was going through the disciple's minds as they came into Jerusalem on that first Palm Sunday? What was Jesus feeling as he rode into Jerusalem on that donkey? Our danger is that knowing the outcome we minimise the intensity of the events and feelings of Holy Week because we know it turned out OK in the end.

Palm Sunday dramatises for us the chasm in understanding which existed between Jesus and everyone around him. While his disciples and the happy shouting crowds were welcoming their king, Jesus was alone. Really alone - no one understood what he was doing - no one grasped what was about to happen!

When we talk of Christ's suffering - we think primarily of the Cross. We miss the agony of the anticipation, the loneliness that Jesus felt throughout the last week of his life. The shame of abandonment and torture. And because we miss his anguish we minimise the significance of many of the events of that last week. With the benefit of hindsight we rush on to the resurrection - to the good news and the nice celebrations.

Maybe this is because we don't like bad news, we don't like sadness, pain and agony and so often people don't come to church during Holy Week because we want to ignore this part of the story. However, the good news of Easter Day, only fully makes sense if we have also made ourselves face the bad news. Only then can we fully appreciate what Jesus did – that he entered the depths of pain and anguish out of love for us. It's only by living through Holy Week that we can fully realise that Jesus really and truly understands the pain and suffering that we face in our lives and can minister to us in our dark places.

There is something happening in our Benefice Churches every day during Holy Week and each service will help us through words, images and music to relive, to re-imagine the story of that first Holy Week. I would urge you to come along to each service - and if you can't get transport but would like to come then please let someone know and we'll see what we can do to help get you there. Do take this opportunity to live through Holy Week, but as we do this, let's not get too far ahead of the plot anticipating the final outcome. Instead, let us, to the best of our ability, stay with the story watching and feeling it unfold day by day.
