#### Ugborough Parish Walking Group Merryl Docker


Our February walk was considerably better than our trip around the Burial ground in the icy grip of Boxing Day!

# Book Lovers Anne Nonymous

#### The Mozart Question by Michael Morpurgo

Mr Morpurgo writes about the story - 'I learned some time ago that in many concentration camps, the Nazis selected Jewish prisoners and forced them to play in orchestras; for the musicians it was simply a way to survive - also seeing a little boy in a square by the Accademia Bridge in Venice, listening to a busker' - these two things that came together for this story. Although written for 8 years upward, some background knowledge would be useful to understand and appreciate this moving story.

### The Widow's Tale by Mick Jackson

In the face of the sudden death of her husband, the narrator flees to the Norfolk coast, where she takes a cottage. Was it to escape from people's sympathy? We get to know bit by bit why she made this journey, confronting her life and her marriage, which wasn't perfect. This is a novel about a very difficult time in someone's life, but even so it is a moving, amusing and readable book, where the reader can believe in the woman's situation. I loved this book, it was natural and human and written with great empathy.

Your Stars Tonight. "Gosh - chasing the Northern Lights in the Arctic is a jolly exciting pastime!" I enthuse as we are slowly hauled up the highest mountain in Sweden. "Are you referring to the unusual experience of sitting inside a snow cloud in the pitch dark at minus 15 degrees, or perhaps the vision of us looking like a couple of overdressed Michelin Men dangling 100 metres above a precipice" the muffled voice of the steamed dietor enquires from underneath layers of thermal insulation beyond counting. Prospects of Northern Lights are glum when we finally stagger out of the chair lift at the top of the mountain to be greeted by a complete white out brought about by the Arctic equivalent of scattered showers. "I think a quick snifter in yonder mountain top cafe is called for" I say and am relieved that the treasurer of the Ugborough "Aurora or Bust" expedition has also decided that £10 for a glass of lager is very reasonable.

Just before midnight the sky clears and there they are - the Northern lights - curtains of delicate green and yellow light slowly dance above our heads. Then they change into sheets of soft green streaked with black columns and on the other side of the sky a pink patch of light appears. A few minutes later they have transformed into a ribbon of light stretching from one side of the sky to the other and the mind struggles to comprehend that they are hanging a hundred kilometres above our head. I am astounded to see the seven stars of Pleiades shining through the curtains of light and then for a few minutes the snow clouds clear to reveal Orion marching over the horizon and in his dagger the Orion Nebula is just visible.

What a strange and wonderful coincidence! The Northern Lights glow green from the high energy particles blasted out of the sun colliding with oxygen atoms at the edge of our atmosphere. Thirty thousand light years away the light of the stars embedded in the thin gas cloud that makes up the Orion Nebula also blast the oxygen atoms to give a pale green tint to the nebula when viewed through the telescope.

As the lights swirled above our heads the steamed dietor mused "Wouldn't it be wonderful if we had a City Banker living in the village who decided to make a Big Society gesture and spent his 2011 bonus to pay for every one in Ugborough to come and see this". "Let's be realistic" I say "we will need to find a second banker's bonus to pay for the drinks".



#### History Corner Alan Yates

Ugborough man was one of the first free settlers in Victoria, Australia James Bickford Moysey was born and baptised in Ugborough in 1809. Bickford was his mother's maiden name. The Moyseys had been in the locality since the 1600s. Susanna Brown Treeby was born in Modbury in 1825. Not being the eldest, James had inherited little or nothing and times were hard. There were no industrial jobs and the area for farming was very limited. James fell in love with Susannah, who was scarcely more than half his age and the two, convinced that somehow love would find a way, married in 1843 when she was 18.

The administrators of New South Wales had, by that time, realised that their vast new country could never be developed properly with convict labour, a few emancipists and adventurers, and the limited number of free settlers.

Newcomers of "sound British stock" were needed most urgently. For the Port Phillip District, later Victoria, the newly formed Colonial Land and Emigration Commission contracted with a London firm to convey British people to Port Phillip "at the rate of £18/14/0 per statute adult". James and Susannah who had saved up £100, thought it over and so did his cousin Nicholas. The three decided to seek together those fresh fields offered by the Commission and they sailed by the barque "Sea Queen", 414 tons, ex London, Plymouth and Cork on January 11, 1844. Landfall in Port Phillip was on April 15, 1844.

For a few months the two men took casual employment in the township of Melbourne, but the conditions were not good enough, so they decided to pioneer the "bush-land". James and Nicholas took out a joint lease on land of about 3200 acres in about September 1844. They built a three-roomed wattle-and-daub, thatched hut near the cliff-top. After settling in, a good deal of work had to be done. Waterholes had to be developed, clearing had to be done for grazing, kitchen garden, etc. and fencing and housing for stock, and tracks had to be cut. Then a baby arrived who was baptised Treeby, after his mother's family. Besides looking after the livestock, James grew vegetables, fished and did odd jobs. Susannah saw to the baby, the dairy, household washing and cooking and the making of clothes.

Finding that the 3200 acres was too big to manage after the death of Nicholas, James decided to give up the outlying areas and to concentrate on the central 640 acres. Their second child, George Bickford Moysey was born in December 1850. Gold was discovered in Victoria in 1851 and James joined in the diggings, soon striking it rich. The new Government of Victoria cancelled all the land leases and put the surveyed blocks up to public auction. James successfully purchased a block of 80 acres of his previously leased land.

James Bickford Moysey died in 1889 on his Narre Warren Farm at the age of 80. Susannah then went to live with her daughter Elizabeth until she too passed on in 1895 aged 70. James is known as the founder of the district of Beaumaris.



The Police reported on the disturbing increase in thefts of metal in the area and asked parishioners to be vigilant and report to the police any suspicious activity - thefts include galvanised farm gates, lead flashing and catalytic convertors from parked vehicles (including one from a 4x4 parked in Ugborough)

The Rural Areas Site Allocation Development Plan Document has now been adopted by SHDC, following publication of the Inspector's report. The site RA29 in Ugborough has been removed from the Plan due to its unsatisfactory access, which leaves Ugborough with no identified sites for affordable housing. There are alternative approaches to meeting housing need in the Parish, and it is hoped that these will be discussed at the Ugborough Parish Meeting.

The Ugborough Parish Meeting is to be held at Ugborough Village Hall on Wednesday 6 April from 7.30pm. This is your opportunity as parishioners to raise issues which affect you - and to discuss future housing development in Ugborough. Representatives from the Police, Dartmoor National Park Authority, Devon County Council and South Hams District Council will be there - so come along and let your voice be heard!

<u>Budget cutbacks</u> were outlined by both your District and County Councillors, and it was emphasised that the District and County elements of your Council Tax would not be increased in 2011/2. Devon County Council has to make savings of 11% in the coming year, much of which will be achieved through staff cuts - it has a Vacancy Management Policy and has reduced the number of senior management posts by restructuring the Council.

<u>Modbury Mayhem</u> County Cllr Mumford has warned of road works in Modbury town centre for 3 weeks from the 28<sup>th</sup> February, which will make the town very difficult to negotiate - you have been warned!

<u>Planning Applications</u> No objections were raised to the retrospective application for change of use from holiday to permanent residential at 3 Broady Park, Filham; the retrospective application for stables and hay store at Lower Yard, south of Gas Works, Moorhaven; the general purpose barn for dry storage and machinery on land adjacent to 3 Leigh Close, Ivybridge; or the works to trees at Hill House, Ugborough.

<u>Modbury Tourist Information Centre</u> has received a grant of £60 from the Parish Council. In addition to its excellent service in promoting tourism services locally, it also provides services and information to local residents, including WiFi internet access, bus timetables, tide times and weekly car parking tickets



Love itself is what is left over, when being in love has burned away. Doesn't sound very exciting, does it? But it is!
