

There will be TWO walks this month!





Beryl's Bookworms -Sue Johns

November's book was 'The Night Circus' by Erin Morgenstern. We approached this book with great anticipation: it came highly recommended with rave reviews- and it promised to be a very read..... Well, it certainly was that!



The book was magical....... literally, and told the tale of two young people who were unwittingly pitted against each other in a contest to the death to prove who possessed the strongest powers of illusion. This contest was fought within a travelling Night Circus, where fantastic feats and impossible acts enthralled audiences who followed the fabulous circus around the world.

Full of elaborate description and exclusively visual, this book split the group into two very opinionated camps! Some who loved it, were transported back to their childhood memories of make believe where imagination was the essence of a care free youth. Others were wrapped in a cocoon of escapism and thoroughly enjoyed to go where the book took them. On the other hand... a core of us who avoided all fantasy from Alice In Wonderland to Harry Potter were exasperated at the seeming lack of depth, sincerity and any connection with reality. Several were unable to finish the book, whilst others could not wait to lose themselves in the pages.

The meeting closed with the most diverse scores ever, which reflected the extreme views expressed! An average of 2 out of 5, this book had the dubious honour of sporting the lowest score to date.

<u>Your Stars Tonight</u>. "The Yuletide spirit is a wondrous social glue that holds together the community that we are proud to call Ugborough" flutes the steamed dietor and with glistening eyes she adorns the front page of the newsletter with festive clip art. "You mean just like the stars are held together

by the tenuous bonds of gravity?" I begin to pontificate but then wander off down the darkened garden.

On a clear winter's night the evidence of gravity's power can be seen in the little group of stars making up the Pleiades or Seven Sisters, which each evening, are becoming higher southern sky. 100 million years ago a cloud of dust and gas contracted under the gentle force of gravity to the point at which stars were ignited by nuclear fusion to create this star cluster. With the naked eye least 7 little stars can be seen (although those of us with younger eyes may see up to nine) but binoculars reveal a glorious sight of around 50 sparkling stars. Look just below them and there is another much more scattered cluster of stars around the bright orange star of Aldebaran - the vengeful eye of Taurus the Bull. This is the Hyades star cluster which is another magnificent sight through binoculars. They are much closer than the Pleiades, at 150 light years distant and probably five times older - like many of us as they got older they have lost their youthful sparkle.

In fact most of the stars in our galaxy seem to clump together into little families and communities of stars loosely held together by their local gravitational attraction. Beyond the edge of our Milky Way, the stars peter out, as though they have all been sucked into the our galaxy, until we come to our nearest galactic neighbour - the Andromeda Galaxy. This is now directly overhead and readily seen with binoculars. It is an awe inspiring sight that, like the Grand Canyon (and Sennen Cove) everyone should see before they die. It may be 2 million light years away from our galaxy but our mutual gravitational attraction has bound us together and with a couple of other nearby galaxies we make up a little flock of galaxies.

But now astronomers, using Hubble images and mind numbing computer power have found that our little galactic family is in fact part of an enormous community of thousands of galaxies (named Laniakea - the Hawaiian for immeasurable heaven) containing (deep breath) perhaps 100, million, billion stars in total and which stretches across over 500 million light years of space.

"All held together by the gentle attraction of gravity." Which is what I thought a few weeks ago after I sprinted stark naked from the shower to answer the phone only to find the coefficient of friction suddenly change to zero, Newton's Third Law sent my head and feet in opposite directions and gravity operated through Newton's Second Law and cruelly brought my head in contact with the floor. Stars - I had 'em!

SPORTS REPORT - Janner Motson SURF CLUB

For the next in the series on favourite clubs I went to see the world renowned Ugborough Surfers - Against Sewerage, Sunburn and Eating Sand, more commonly known as US-ASSES. These rugged individuals brave all weathers to enjoy their sport in the choppy seas of Devon and Cornwall and I caught up with some of them in Polzeath recently. As intrepid, fearless types they glow with a 'coolness' that one associates with an elite; as they undoubtedly regard themselves.

Commensurate with the 'cool' is the need for a 'rad' name and they go by short, single ones, much as the great Brazilian footballers. I met up with one flame-haired beauty they called 'Shaz', who told me about the King of the Surfers, 'Hughsey', often seen hanging 10 out the back...of the Ship. She said that he had an almost mythical bond with the Ocean and that few could tell where the breakers end and his grey hair begins.

However, it seems that there is one even cooler than 'Hughsey', one so cool that his name is shorter than any; one who goes by a single letter.....'A'. Rarely seen close to the beach 'A' inhabits the green water, where monsters lurk - areas only visited by the best like former Ugborough Champions 'Lynz' and 'Bulgey'; both winners on long and short boards, although 'Bulgey' is more famous for his range of short shorts called 'Bulgey-Burglars'. I asked one sexy young chick called 'A-M' (presumably because she gets up early to surf) what brings them to the big waves; she told me "Bulgey's passion wagon, but we also like the big cooked breakfasts". Hire rates are very high at the moment and our new Bookings Secretary, Philomena, is busy staying on top of requests and payments, but it is important that hirers clean up after themselves as the caretaker only does a full clean once a week. It has been noted that some are not cleaning the oven properly after use so watch out for us chasing you up if it is you!

Christmas is coming and your Parish Council aims to make it a joyful one by contributing to the costs of festive lighting outside Ugborough Church, Bittaford Methodist Hall and Bittaford Community Hall. Merry Christmas!

Planning applications No objections were raised to the proposed rear extensions at Rutt Farm, Ivybridge; the agricultural shed and domestic garage and change of use to domestic land at Yolland Farm, Bittaford; the agricultural building at Little Allers Farm, Avonwick; nor the storage barn at the Donkey Sanctuary, Godwell Lane, Ivybridge. The proposed relocated field gate, fence and hedge at Parsonage Lane, Ugborough received support; while no objections were raised to the replacement stables at Shellwood Farm, Ugborough, subject to a condition that the existing stables be removed.

Councillors objected to the outline application for approx. 198 dwellings, public open space, employment (including Health Centre), neighbourhood centre and new roundabout on Exeter Road on land off Rutt Lane, Ivybridge on the grounds that the number of dwellings should be reduced to 150, with the 'affordable' provision being increased to 35%. Land should also be retained to safeguard a future entrance from the Cross-in-Hand.

Many of you will be relieved to learn that the two proposed wind turbines at Stone Farm, above Ugborough have been refused.

SHDC Clirs Holway & Ward reported on the pressure being exerted on the Government by SHDC to support the future economic resilience of the South West Peninsula by investing in improved strategic road and rail links. A Hercules Project is being undertaken in the area between Dartmoor and the AONB, in which researchers investigate cultural landscapes by talking to landowners and farmers - if you would like to be involved, please contact SHDC.

Community Defibrillators were discussed with Dr Gwynne, and it has been decided to join with Modbury Parish Council in submitting a TAP application to fund defibrillators at the church entrance and by the tennis & football clubs.

The Neighbourhood Development Plan should be completed by November 2015, and you will be able to follow its progress and get involved through a new website and social media - look out for details!

Local Homes for Local People is a new leaflet being produced by SHDC's Affordable Housing Team, with the aim of working together as a district to identify suitable areas of land 'and then turn aspirations into realities'. In addition, the Team is able to provide advice and help on a range of issues - for more information, call the Team on 01803 861234.

Consultations continue to pour in:

• Electoral Review of Devon County Council, in which it is intended to reduce the number of County Councillors from 62 to 60. The consultation runs to the 19 January, and you can get involved by going to www.consultation.lgbce.org.uk

• DCC invites comments and suggestions by the 5 December on the proposed additional public bridleways through Filham Park. Further information is available at www.devon.gov.uk/prow.

The Stone Farm Wind Turbine Decision

As the Parish Clerk has reported, the Stone Farm wind turbine application by William Luscombe was refused by South Hams District Council. During a vigorous campaign there were 160 objections and 17 who showed support. Many of those concerned were worried about the impact on the landscape.

Brown Bin Collections- A guide to what to put in your brown bin.

Yes please

- Any cooked or uncooked food waste, including meat, fish and vegetable peelings
- Garden waste grass, hedge and plant cuttings, weeds, flowers and leaves (branches up to 10cm diameter)

No plastics, soil, rubble or cardboard

Cardboard should be placed in your <u>blue recycling sack</u>, or flattened and placed beside it. Card can no longer be placed in the brown bin

- Alternatively, you can take it to your local recycling centre
- Compost at home
- If you can't do any of the above it can go in your grey bin or seagull proof refuse

Remember, your bins and sacks must be at the boundary of your property by 7am on collection day (fortnightly). Garden and food waste gives off a green house gas if sent to landfill. However, if composted correctly it produces a valuable soil conditioner. To help us keep this service affordable - lids must be closed. You can find outlets for buying compostable caddy liners on the South Hams website, but remember wrapping food waste in newspaper is perfectly fine.

Ring and Ride Community Transport

Do you find it difficult to use public transport? If so, your local Ring and Ride may be able to help with a door to door service. It is available to everyone of pensionable age or those with a disability. It is also available for those living in a village with no car and poor public transport.

Please remember that a "Dog is for life, not just for Christmas". Please do not buy a puppy as a Christmas gift unless you fully understand the responsibilities which they come with -

- Time consuming training (essential);
- Routine (essential) and perhaps, emergency visits to the vet, which can be costly;
- Walkies twice a day regardless of the weather (at least 20 mins twice a day)!;
- Proper shelter, food and water;
- Careful consideration of what happens to him/her when you are on holiday;
- A life of picking up and correctly disposing dog poo, whether an adult walks the dog, or whether this is delegated to a younger family member.

And then hopefully you will have a lifetime of playful interaction, a lot of fun, and the best friend ever! If you are keen on getting a dog, please consider rescuing one from a re-homing centre, but make sure that you know as much about him as possible, and that he is the right one for you, your home and your family, there is nothing worse for the dog than being moved from one owner to another and another.

My dear Friends,

Before long we shall be singing 'Joy to the world', 'Good Christian men, rejoice', 'Christians awake, salute the happy morn' 'Ding dong, merrily on high', 'Hark the herald angels sing', 'O come, all ye faithful, joyful and triumphant' and many other carols that speak of singing, making merry and rejoicing in many different ways.

Sometimes, though, as we look around the world and take in extremist movements, the Calais migrants and others willing to put their lives at risk to escape persecution by taking to the high seas in rust-buckets, those forced to leave ancestral holdings and relocate because of rising sea-levels, human trafficking and the modern slave trade, the Ebola outbreak, people in need of foodbanks, loan sharks, historic and present cases of child abuse and so on and so on, rejoicing may seem totally out of place.

When you come to think of it, perhaps rejoicing was rather far from Mary and Joseph's mind as they trudged the road to Bethlehem. They'd been forced by a hated, foreign regime to take an unwelcome and untimely journey, Mary was facing childbirth without either medical care or family support, there was no room for them in the inn.

And when Mary again took the body of her son in her arms, after his brutal execution - apparently the culmination of the life she had brought into the world that night in Bethlehem - her heart must have been pierced to the quick rather than full of joy.

But it is those facts that, paradoxically, give rise to our rejoicing - that God has come to share our world, to affirm that our physical existence, our educational opportunities, our business endeavours, our political systems, our relationships, our joys, our suffering, our moral dilemmas and everything else about us are crucially important to him - and I use that expression deliberately because 'crucially' actually means 'of the cross'. Those things are so important to God that he chose to enter this world in the form of a baby so he could live alongside us, experience the full gamut of human circumstances and die a hideous death, so sharing in the most extreme suffering that anyone may have to endure.

No other religion can claim that as its central tenet - an awesome and awe-inspiring certainty - that God shares our lives that we may share his, where truth and justice, gentleness and patience, love and forgiveness reign supreme. So let us indeed rejoice and be merry this Advent and Christmastide.
