# <u>G-UP Creating a community where it's easy to live</u> <u>sustainably-</u> Rowan Martin

David Attenborough's documentary "A life on Our Planet" was released in late September. The film is billed by Attenborough as his "witness statement" giving a stark assessment of the changes he has seen and lived through over six decades of wildlife film making. Attenborough is regularly listed among the figures most trusted by the public. His opinions matter to people, and this film is important to anyone who cares about...well anything really. So we thought we should probably watch it.

As a way of navigating the COVID restrictions we decided to venture into the world of shared online viewing experiences, trialling a "watch party". The idea was to simultaneously watch the film from the comfort of our own homes and meet for a chat on Zoom after. A bit like going to the cinema and then grabbing a beer in the bar afterwards - except without the cinema or bar. Not quite the same, but then what is currently?

The journey starts with compelling footage of animals walking through empty buildings close to Chernobyl. It's a bittersweet image - nature is thriving but people are absent from the scene. Attenborough then takes us through his life bringing the timescales into sharp relief. When he made his first documentary the world still had 66% of wilderness remaining and CO<sub>2</sub> concentrations were at 280ppm. Today, only 35% remains and CO<sub>2</sub> concentrations have surpassed 415ppm. The second half of the film is dedicated to projecting hope - what can be achieved if decisive and dramatic action is taken now? While some of the solutions offered are a bit simplistic, it makes it clear that all is not lost, while we can't rely on someone else to fix these problems. Time to get cracking then!

So, the nascent G-Up working groups are starting to take shape. the "Wildlife and Biodiversity" working group has secured sapling trees from the Woodland Trust and is

currently looking to develop our own source of tree saplings. If you have land that needs planting with trees within the Parish then get in touch. The "Waste reduction and recycling" group has found a new solution for the recycling of crisp packets — watch this space for updates. The "Transport, energy and Renewables" group is investigating a number of initiatives including ways to encourage walking between Ugborough and Bittaford to access the public transport links.

If you fancy getting involved in any of these groups, have ideas or are just mildly curious about what more could be done then we'd love to hear from you.





# Rainfall at Shellwood Hill George Arnison

October started with Storm Alex (named by the French Met Office)... and ended with Storm Aiden (named by the UK & Ireland Met Offices). There was also a Storm Barbara (named by the Spanish Met Office) in the middle – but I'm not sure we noticed it much. None affected us too badly, but they contributed to a month that just felt wet and dull overall. In fact the Met Office have it down as the fifth "dullest" October in the UK since 1919...which is a metric I didn't know existed! At Shellwood Hill I recorded 213mm (just under 8.5") of rain, which compares to my monthly average for Octobers over the last 11 years of 156mm...and after February it was the wettest (and probably dullest) month this year.





#### Beryl's Bookworms - Norma Roe

Once again, we did not let the Covid restrictions defeat us and we met in two groups of less than 6 in homes and two further members joined through Zoom. However, this month we managed to connect the two



groups through the wonders of technology and so were able to share comments (but not cakes!) Thanks to everyone who enabled this to happen.

Our book was Two Caravans by Marina Lewycka and this provoked a wide range of views. It tells the experiences of migrant workers from (mainly) Eastern Europe doing the unpleasant and menial jobs that no British person wants to even consider doing. The book gives character to the bones of the statistics and we learn of the perils, hardships and friendships born of the search for economic improvement.

The story starts in an idyllic setting- the strawberry fields of Kent and in the field are Two Caravans- one for the male workers and one for the female. The characters are introduced here and after the experiences at the strawberry farm, they travel to different parts of England, usually towing one of the caravans. We learn of the brutality of intensive poultry farming as the migrant workers learn the hard way what cheap food really entails. Some of the scenes here are comic, but most of it is pretty horrifying and the work is dehumanizing. Marina Lewycka tells what is really a dark story with a light touch, and although this appealed to some, others found it distasteful. Indeed, the story includes some depressing truths of exploitation, corruption and sex trafficking amongst the central love story and occasional humour. Desperately important issues are perhaps described with too much levity.

The story is also told from different viewpoints- including a dog- and some members found this made it disjointed and difficult to follow. So overall very mixed views on this book (from 4 out of 5 to under 1) and the average score of 2.75 doesn't really reflect the diversity of opinion- that's what makes book groups so interesting!

Poignantly, the book is dedicated to the cockle pickers of Morecombe- migrant workers who tragically lost their lives.

Incidentally we were sad to learn that Marina Lewycka now has a serious neurodegenerative illness and writing is now much more difficult for her. Personally, I really hope that this will not stop her from publishing another book, as she is a real favourite for me.



<u>Your Stars Tonight</u>. The steamed dietor needs constant mental stimulation whilst we are doing our daily surviving Covid/ Lockdown/ damp winter walks around the block. Ever eager to please, I pontificate on some recent scientific research on dreams. In particular, the work was trying to understand why human beings need to dream. I had thought that dreams were the way that the brain makes sense of the previous day's events, shuffling them around and then

filing them as memories for future use. But somehow that mental equivalent of tidying up the office desk at the end of the working day never explained the surreal quirkiness of most people's dreams. This new hypothesis on the need to dream comes from a slightly unexpected angle – thinking about how computer based Artificial Intelligence is trained to recognise things - faces, animals, guns, ships or whatever.

It's all done by programming in some rough and ready rules and then letting a super computer loose on tens of thousands of images until it begins to identify correctly (most of the time) which is a human and which is a cute puppy dog - even though both have two eyes and teeth when viewed from the front (and with their mouths open). Apparently one of the problems with training an Artificial Intelligence is that they can get sloppy and over confident in their predictions and to prevent this the programmers have to regularly feed in fake and junk photos that are obviously wrong in order to knock some sense back into the Al. So, is this what the brain is doing in dreams? Deliberately producing ludicrous and bizarre situations so that the brain gets a mental jolt to make it smarter? Sounds like an interesting idea - but how on earth you could prove it is a different matter all together.

After this exposition I am surprised to find that the steamed dietor's attention seems to have wandered and she is gazing into the far distance across the fields to a rather damp view of a glum Dartmoor. She gestures to a far corner of the meadow "That's a big rabbit, it's hopping like an enormous hare, it can't be a deer, it can't be .... but it must be .... it's a wallaby!"

And in the fading light I am riding a grey stallion down to the Anchor pub, to meet up with old Australian friends, but I can't find the door to the bar and I have ended up in the cellar. Of course, now I remember, there is the secret smugglers' tunnel that comes out underneath the Ship, but it is twisting and getting narrower, at last I have escaped and I'm riding my bike up the hill to a meeting at Toby Cross but it is getting dark and I forgotten my lights. And there is a man in a pointy hat and cloak embroidered in gold stars and he says "we are so lucky that since the first of December we have been blessed with clear skies every night which has meant every evening after dusk we have watched Saturn and Jupiter coming closer together as we approach the Great Conjunction when Earth, Jupiter, and Saturn are almost perfectly aligned". He waves his shepherd's crook and intones in a reverent fashion "And tonight, the 21st December, at 5.30 we will see that they are so close that they appear as one bright star — it's the great conjunction of the millennium". The stars are just coming out in the cloudless sky but then I notice an ominous miasma of mist coming from a huge hole which is opening up in the ground under my feet and my binoculars fall out of my plastic shopping bag and start to slide down the slope into hole and

DNP has published <u>Welcome to Dartmoor walks</u>, aimed at introducing people to Dartmoor's history, heritage and habitats. The routes vary from 3-10km and provide opportunities to eat and drink locally

Two bed housing is needed in the area, suitable for young couples** 

2399/20/FUL Change of use from agricultural to equestrian, erection of single storey barn and access track at Lot A Earlscombe Farm Ugborough **Object, as adequate plans have still not been provided and there is no justification for the stable to be located at the far end of the field**

Do you keep chickens, ducks or geese? Help protect your birds from the risks of bird flu. A National Protection Zone has been put in place for all poultry keepers including those who only keep a few birds in their back yard.

As it is highly contagious, you must act now to reduce the risk of disease to your flock by following biosecurity measures including feeding and watering your flock under cover.

The current mobile library, affectionately known as Gertie, is going into retirement. This van has given 14 years' service to rural communities, but sadly is becoming more and more difficult to keep on the road.

A replacement has been found but it urgently needs to be renovated to meet the needs of the communities that use the mobile library.

The cost to get this 'new' mobile library on the road is £15000.

During lockdown 1 the mobile library team phoned every library customer, and since July we have been on the road again. For the first 2 months to keep customers and staff safe we delivered bags of books, and from September until the current lockdown we've been allowing people to come back on board to choose their own. Customers have been incredibly happy to see the return of the mobile library; many tell us that using our service not only provides their reading material but also gives them the opportunity to meet and talk to other people.

This mobile library carries 2,000 books to rural communities every week and last year, 11,368 books were borrowed by people, young and old. It is much more than a book delivery van though. The mobile library is an educational, social, wellbeing, and cultural service.
