With this Grant we were able to buy festive goods and to reimburse expenses to local residents who made use of their culinary skills to make up hampers that contained, homemade jam, chutney, bread, gingerbread, mince pies, Christmas cake, Christmas puddings, shortbread, hand painted cards, winter posies, table decorations, Buck's Fizz, mulled wine, chocolates, nuts, diaries, fairy lights, pens, diffusers and soaps - all presented in a festive hessian bag.

We do hope this gesture of Christmas cheer will help them through what promises to be a long and tough winter.





Rainfall at Shellwood Hill George Arnison

November this year stands out for....well not very much really. We had another lockdown, it rained most days (but only a bit), was generally unsettled and overcast and didn't feel particularly hot or cold. All pretty run of the mill. At Shellwood Hill I recorded 144mm of rain (just under 6") overall which compares to my 11-year average for the month of 165mm. Apparently it was particularly mild after all, globally being the second warmest November in the 141-year record of Novembers - almost 1 degree C warmer than the 20th century average....and the 44th consecutive November which has exceeded that average. Just need a little bit more sunshine to go with it please.





Beryl's Bookworms – Joan Fletcher

Our book this month was Girl, Woman, Other by Bernardine Evaristo. Evaristo writes fiction, poetry and drama and is Professor of Creative Writing at Brunel University. Girl, Woman, Other is her eighth book and



she was the co-winner of the 2019 Booker Prize, the first black woman to win the prize.

Evaristo has set up many successful projects aimed at the inclusion of writers and artists of colour and was awarded an OBE in the Queen's 2020 birthday honours.

The book follows the lives of 12 characters, most black women, in Britain over the course of several decades. Their ages range from 19 to 93 and they come from different cultural backgrounds and are a mix of sexualities. The novel charts their hopes, struggles and intersecting lives. The book is a snapshot of these overlapping lives as the characters move through the world in different decades and learn how to be. Each character has a chapter but within the chapter their lives overlap, although their experiences, backgrounds and choices are very different. Characters that would often be peripheral in another author's work are, in this book, central to the story. The writing style is experimental, and the prose feels more like poetry with no capital letters and little punctuation. The author says the form is "free-flowing and it allowed me to be inside the characters' heads and go all over the place." We found this style of writing easy to read.

The author says she is "deeply interested in how we become the people we are". This comes over in the stories of the individual characters and added to our enjoyment of the book.

However, there were elements of the story that some of us thought unrealistic, particularly the ending and some of us also found it difficult at times to keep track of all the characters. During our discussion the subject matter was sometimes described as 'edgy'. Evaristo herself says "for many readers, it's not a familiar world, this is a Britain less often depicted in fiction". It may be an unfamiliar world to many of us but most of us enjoyed the book and found it an enlightening and uplifting experience.

The range of scores was from 3 to 5 and we gave the book an overall score of 4.5 out of 5.

Our book next month is 10 Minutes 38 Seconds in this Strange World by Elif Shafak.

<u>Your Stars Tonight</u>. At the beginning of the December I was summoned to the steamed dietor's office for a lockdown briefing. It is made clear to me that my 2020 induced indolence and general aimless meandering over the last year needed to be addressed and I was invited to draw up a list of self improvement projects which would keep Christmas Lockdown Blues at bay. It was made clear that these projects were expected to involve paint brushes, stepladders,

advanced carpentry, patio building and similar exercises to strengthen moral fibre.

With hindsight this was not the best time for me to announce my plans for the Great Conjunction of Jupiter and Saturn on the 21st December. For the three weeks before and after the great event I intended to take photographs at precisely 5.31 pm, framing the planets above St Peter's Church. From these I would create a video capturing the planetary *pas de deux* ballet as Jupiter and Saturn came together and then parted symbolising their eternal cosmic circlings around the sun. Warming to the subject I described how it might be premiered in the Village Hall to a rapturous and vaccinated audience. Perhaps I was being a trifle facetious when I suggested that the steamed dietor could lead community singing of *twinkle*, *twinkle*, *little star*, for it was at this point I perceived a distinct cooling of the matrimonial atmosphere and a preference for my skills being directed at the leak from the waste pipe under the sink.

Alas, the British weather also poured cold water on my plans and the unending rain /drizzle/ downpour that swept across Ugborough in first weeks of December. By the evening of the 18th the complete absence of photographs was getting embarrassing, so despite an unpromising forecast for around sunset, I gritted teeth and headed up the hill festooned with photographic tripods, cameras and lenses.

I congratulated myself on arriving in good time just minutes after sunset — although that was well disguised by 100% cloud cover. I fussed about setting up tripods and cameras and was astounded to look up and find the skies had cleared except for a line of clouds over the sea. This was the big moment! The clouds parted again to reveal, just above Mothecombe, a stunning Crescent Moon making a thin and fragile curve with the shadowed side tinted with the faintest pink from the earthshine. And then, as the twilight deepened, Jupiter and Saturn appeared less than a Moon's width apart, high above the moon and directly over St Peter's Church.

The astronomy photograph of the year was being gifted to me as an early Christmas present.

Phut, clunk ...the camera battery went flat. Then as the bank of cloud crept higher and the moon sank lower, I realised the picture was out of focus and as I scrabbled with the camera controls, my glasses fell off into the wet grass. In desperation, I take some photographs only to realise the moon has disappeared behind the clouds and my perfect photograph of the conjunction has slipped away for another 400 years. With this realisation, it seemed appropriate to thrust my head unto nearby gorse bush to alleviate artistic anguish.

In truth I did get a half decent photograph – and on reflection it is going to be one of my favourite photographs of 2020: for there just below the planets is the illuminated tower of St Peter's Church, the lights of the Christmas tree and the neighbouring houses – a reminder of how lucky I am to live in such a place and with such friends and family – no better place to be in this strange year of 2020 and something that can never be captured digitally.

January Newsletter

Happy New Year! 2021 promises to be a momentous year, as we say goodbye to Covid, and our vibrant community can get together again. After our December Parish Council Meeting, it was rather sad not to head off to the pub for some Christmas drinks – but hopefully the coming year will be far more enjoyable!

Christmas would not have been nearly so jolly without festive lights. Thank you to Richard Prowse for providing the tree, Cllr Ed Johns & his Covid-aware helpers for erecting the lights, to Lilly Cross for suggesting and displaying the tree lights in the Square, and to Cllr Nelson for displaying the tree lights in Bittaford.

County Clir Hosking reported, at the start of our Meeting, on the new Covid statistics and local restrictions. Funding is available for those facing hardship:

- For families facing hardship over the Christmas break an online application is available at https://southhams.gov.uk/help and the helpline telephone number is (01803) 861297.
- DCC is offering grants of £300 to £700 for Parish Councils and voluntary bodies to help those obliged to self-isolate or quarantine – go to https://www.devon.gov.uk/coronavirus-advice-in-devon/document/covid-19-fund/
- A new grant from £500 to £934 is available for businesses who are not subject to Non-Domestic Rating and have suffered significant financial impact or have been closed.
- Guidance on how to obtain help is available for Parishioners is available from the CAB 0344 411 1444, and 'soft touch' signposting for businesses through the Heart of the Southwest Local Enterprise Partnership 03456 047047

Complaints had been received that the character of the A3121 had been lost, with the installation of kerbstones and removal of grass triangles at junctions, and Cllr Hosking explained that the Safer Road Fund package was relatively inflexible – but this loss of character should be balanced with the net improvements from the scheme. The 6m width of the improved A3121 was designed so that HGVs could pass, but excess speed would be discouraged.

Waste collections had suffered disruption due to a Covid outbreak, and District Cllr Abbott advised that uncollected waste should be taken in until the next scheduled collection – hopefully, this problem will be past news by the time this Newsletter is published!

<u>3532/20/FUL</u> Application for construction of detached 4 bed dwelling and double garage as modification to planning application 0242/18/FUL at Godwell House, Godwell Lane, lvybridge **Neutral**

<u>0526/20</u> Construction of garage at Maple Lodge, Bittaford **Neutral**

<u>3676/20/FUL</u> Change of use of land to residential curtilage/garden at The Beeches, Ermington Road, Ivybridge **Neutral**

<u>0464/20</u> Amendments to design of pergola/screen. Replacement extension to include external pergola/screen walls at Windbells, 5 Highfield Terrace, Bittaford **Object. Proposal** is a breach of Policy DMD4 as it would have an overbearing and dominant impact on the neighbouring property. Applicant has not complied with the previous breach of condition notice

<u>3653/20/HHO</u> Householder application for fence to enclose back garden (retrospective) at 1 Butterdon Walk, Ivybridge PL21 OHS **Neutral**

Grant funding from the Parish Council was made available for local good causes. Citizens Advice South Hams was awarded £150 – they have experienced a huge surge in demand during the pandemic. Libraries Unlimited were granted £100 towards the refurbishment of a second-hand van to replace their current lyybridge Mobile Library with the aim of 'bringing books and a lifeline to 80 rural communities in South Hams and West Devon'.

The consultation of the Interim Devon Carbon Plan is currently under wraps, but will be well publicised by the time the Newsletter is published. The publicity states that 'Residents will have the chance to shape the county's roadmap to creating a net-zero Devon, where people and nature thrive'. The topics range from active travel, renewable energy, and improved air quality to better insulation and warmer homes, reduced fuel poverty and eating more balanced diets. These actions will help to create a fairer, healthier and stronger Devon. From December 7th, have your say at

<u>www.devonclimateemergency.org.uk/interimcarbonplan</u> or request a paper copy and consultation questionnaire from your local library from January 1st.

The next Parish Council Meeting will be held remotely on Wednesday 6th January starting at 7.30 p.m., when the budget and precept for the next financial year will be agreed. Agenda and minutes will be displayed on the website and noticeboards.
