## Vernon Tuck's Diamond Jubilee Sue Johns

Vernon has been playing the organ in Ugborough Church for 60 years!

As I type, we are planning to celebrate this amazing achievement at the end of April, with a special service encompassing the church's year and singing Vernon's favourite hymns and anthems.

Vernon learnt to play the piano at the tender age of 5 with his Auntie Floss in Plymouth - and then continued studying the organ with Miss Cummings from Yealmpton.

Joining the 32 strong choir at the age of 8, under the watchful eye of organist and choirmaster Mr Beer (headteacher of Ugborough School) Vernon had an exceptional treble voice and was often chosen to sing solos.

Vernon's keyboard performance debut was at Ugborough's Gospel Hall where he performed Handel's Largo on the harmonium at 10 years of age.

Vernon was asked to play for Choir Practices when he was twelve - and began playing at Evensong at 16, he then quickly progressed to the official position of St Peter's Honorary Church Organist.

Conscription at the age of 18 interrupted Vernon's plans to train as a teacher. During this time, the army allowed Vernon to return to Ugborough every weekend to play at Services. On his demob. at 20, Vernon returned to take up a temporary career nursing at Moorhaven, where he stayed for 24 years!

A Sunday routine was then established when Vernon played the organ for Moorhaven chapel services at 9.30 and 2.00; then at 5t Peter's at 11.00 and 6.00 - walking to each service.

Vernon has served under 6 vicars before the current Mission Community Team.

In addition Vernon has played at many local churches - mostly for funerals, from Elburton to Plympton - and from Cornwood to Brooking.

Vernon modestly describes his skill as his way of worshipping and glorifying God.

The current choir relies on Vernon's commitment to both Friday practices and the Sunday service. Vernon is always willing to give new pieces of music a go and we would certainly be lost without him!


## WW1 Memorial Herb Garden

#### Beryl's Bookworms - Sue Johns

Our April book was 'Mr Rosenblum's List: Or Friendly Guidance for Aspiring Englishman' by Natasha Solomons. The story follows the and tribulations of Jakob and Sadie Rosenblum, Jewish immigrants,



in the Fifties. Rosenblum's determination to fit into English Society is aided by the pamphlet 'While you are in England - Helpful information' presented to him on arrival. Jakob soon adapts this pamphlet to a list he considers more appropriate which he attempts to follow at all times. Conflict arises between the couple as Sadie attempts to hang on to her cultural roots - and Jack Rose (renamed) attempts to combat the anti-Semitism he experiences by building his own world class golf course in deepest Dorset. The narrative is full of detailed description of the English countryside - and for the majority of the book group this, coupled with the initial poignant rejection of the main characters into English society, provided an engrossing read. As the story unfolded and the Dorset country folk accepted the 'foreigners' into their community most of our Group were pleasantly entertained and delighted with the outcome.

For the minority of the Group, Jack's 'Harry Worth' like character was worryingly comic. Unfortunately too for the dissenters, the gross inaccurate observations of the countryside totally detracted from any credibility the story might have generated otherwise..... For Example: A shiny combine traversing the country lanes to plough a field (?) - The mechanical cutting of the verges (In Dorset in the fifties.. doubtful), and the efforts to remove mole hills that required a mechanical digging contraption..... As ever we thoroughly enjoyed a very healthy debate - and the marks reflected our views, ranging from 1 to 5 - providing the inevitable average of 3!

## Your Stars Tonight.

"It's absolutely scandalous! " I fulminate. "I will have to write a strongly worded letter of complaint to the Parish Newsletter". The steamed dietor wearily lifts her head from behind her gently smouldering lap top and gives me a quizzical

look. "In the March Newsletter it said quite clearly that Jupiter's moons blink out and in of sight as they enter and then exit Jupiter's shadow. I watched Io appear from the shadow last night and it took at least 30 seconds for the moon to be fully illuminated as the sunlight lit its surface - no way did it blink at me." "I'm glad you have clarified that" mutters the steamed dietor, "it must be time for your medication and then walkies".

And so I find myself thinking about planets "in opposition" - the point in their orbits when they line up with the earth and sun and are at their closest distance to the earth. Jupiter was in opposition in March and already it is dropping from its highest point in the sky and by the end of the month will be setting before midnight in the west and fading fast.

Mars has just passed its opposition with us and for the next few weeks is easily recognisable low in the southern sky with its distinctive (uncooked) salmon colouration. At its closest in April it was a relatively bright but its size at 15 arc seconds across was much smaller then Jupiter's hefty 50 arc seconds. Through a small telescope its dark patches could be glimpsed - these are huge expanses of dark rock scoured clean of the characteristic red dust by the Martian winds.

As Mars approaches opposition it shows the phenomenon of retrograde motion against the background stars – and this drove astronomers over several millennium to distraction. The planets, like the sun and the moon move across the sky in a fairly predictable fashion (predictable, that is, if you are a full time Babylonian or Mayan astronomer). But around opposition Mars, Jupiter and Saturn all appear to slow and then reverse direction westward against the background stars before reversing again and then continuing in their normal easterly direction. For astronomers assuming that the universe was based on a nice simple earth centred system in which everything revolves around us, this caused immense intellectual problems. It is only when the earth is demoted to third rock from the sun that the explanation becomes clear - we on earth are on the inside track and are actually overtaking the more distant Mars on the outside track and against the background of distant stars this gives the illusion Mars has gone into reverse.

And to complete the trio of oppositions, on  $15^{th}$  May it is Saturn's turn - unfortunately it is very low in the southern sky and atmospheric turbulence will make it difficult to see clearly. Despite this the wonder of Saturn's rings are now splendidly displayed at an angle of 22 degrees and as always they make a breath taking sight through a telescope. Enjoy the planets in opposition!

#### NEVER GIVE UP!

This week it is time to reflect on a call I hear from one of the 8 year olds in the Uggies - he is always shouting encouragement and often calls 'Never give up'. He has learned this from the club coaches and the way that the club approaches the game. There have been excellent examples of this attitude in the past year from both the U12s and U15s.

The former were the remains of the previous year's squad that crumbled when some of the good players left to seek fame and fortune. They had a tough start to this season regularly losing to double figures, not helped by relying on a squad built mainly on U11s. However, Dave the Priv, Privett took them on a third of the way through the season and worked hard to mould a team from those players that were available. He focused them on playing as a team and the passing game, and it was still tough, but then almost imperceptibly the worm turned and other managers noticed. They eventually achieved some draws and now have 3 wins and are looking as competitive as any in the division. What is special is that they did it with the same players who were getting whipped, meaning that if you want to turn a problem around try and do it with your mates rather than rely on prima donnas.

The U15s suffered a similar problem when some influential players went elsewhere after half a dozen successful games. The results dried up and they were becoming easy to beat. However, using the same squad as before the managers Dan and Steve, working with their new coach Pete, managed to rebuild the spine of the team, find roles for everyone and they started to play the type of football that shows confidence. At time of writing they are unbeaten in 3 games and it is clear from the faces how much they are all enjoying playing this way. Relying on one or 2 individuals does not build this team ethos and does not give the same satisfaction as everyone playing their part.

So, it is very heartening to hear the youngest squad also recognising the value of the team and a positive attitude that will put them in a good place to deal with the tough times - and be able to sort their issues themselves (with a little prompt from the coaching team). Anyone can win with the best players, but can anyone make a successful unit from the other?...One to ponder in life as well as football.

The April Parish Council Meeting started with a number of queries about unauthorised 'development' in the parish. The removal of a hedgerow and possible change of use were flagged up, and have been reported to the planning authority. If you are concerned that a planning infringement has taken place, then please report it to the Parish Council or online at www.southhams.gov.uk or www.dartmoor-npa.gov.uk, and complete a Planning Breach form.

Following the flooding at Undertown, the Parish Council has bought two flood warning signs. The signs and emergency spotlight can be borrowed from George Fletcher - call\_01752 892939 or 07715 168903. In addition, the Parish Council has finally received confirmation that a grit bin will be installed at Undertown/Lutterburn Street, so hopefully most environmental hazards can now be remedied in that corner of the village!

Planning applications Only one application, for change of use from agricultural barn to residential holiday accommodation at The Milking Parlour, Langford Barton. Councillors raised no objection, but would prefer the use of existing openings rather than the proposed additional openings.

The Neighbourhood Development Plan is progressing towards developing a Vision & Objectives Statement, and it is hoped to present the statement at the Ugborough Fair. Grant funding has been flooding into the Parish Council, and distributed to a number of

worthwhile causes. SHDC had provided £600 Locality funding, £100 of which was spent on emergency flood equipment at Undertown, and £500 towards the WWI Commemorative herb garden on the church lawn.

In addition, TAP funding from SHDC/DCC will be spent on:

- 'e-seniors' a project to train and support the more senior members of the community, enabling them to become e-savvy and make full use of the opportunities offered by the internet; and
- 'Going the Extra Mile' additional days for the Parish Lengthsman to clear more buddle holes and gullies to alleviate flooding. Without wishing to be inundated, please let the Clerk know of any highway drainage that needs attention.

Broadband in Ugborough may become 'Superfast' in early 2016, which is something to look forward to. Councillors met Gary Streeter MP and representatives from Devon County Council and BT to discuss progress, and survey work on Superfast Broadband is due to start soon.

The Parish Councillor vacancy remains unfilled. If you are interested in becoming a Parish Councillor, please contact the Clerk or Chairman George Beable on 01364 649273. The vacancy will be filled by co-option (no election), Parish Council Meetings are held once a month and training will be provided.

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held at Ugborough Village Hall on Wednesday 7th May at 7.30pm and promises to be very interesting, as Merryl Docker of the Ugborough History Society will be presenting the 'World War I Ugborough Experience'. This is a meeting for you, the community, so come along!

The next Parish Council Meeting will be held on Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> May at Ugborough Village Hall. Agenda and minutes are displayed on the noticeboards and website.

## Poppies for Remembrance - Rev'd Caroline Luff

The diocese has linked up with Sutton's Seeds to provide each churchyard with some Northlew poppy seeds to plant in readiness for the anniversary of the outbreak of the First World War. Northlew lost the greatest proportion of its population of any community in that conflict - of a total of 100 souls in the village, 24 were killed so many families were wiped out. They are preparing a 20 mile poppy avenue, for which Suttons has donated 330,000,000 seeds.

Ours will be a more modest scheme - but keep your antennae out to hear when they will be planted in each of our villages.
