#### St Peter's Church- Sue Johns

Thanks to generous donations after our All-Age Service in September, we have been able to forward £536 to the charity 'Open Hearts, Open Borders' who are specifically involved in emergency support and resettlement for Afghan arrivals in Plymouth.

Our Harvest collection of non-perishable food went to the Shekinah Mission in Plymouth, who among other activities, run a hostel offering temporary accommodation for people experiencing homelessness. All our perishable donations went to the Ivybridge Food Bank – and the £148.80 from the collection at our All-Age Harvest Service has been sent to the Farm Community Network. This charity helps all those in farming in many practical ways, such as help with animal health and welfare, difficulties with finance, as well as relationships, health, and wellbeing. They are available every day at the end of a phone from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. A lifeline for farmers who often work alone with a sea of bureaucracy and uncertain times.

It's great to be emerging from such a traumatic 18 months to allow our church, once more, to organise help for **other** charities who have also experienced a dramatic loss of income.

# <u>G-UP Creating a community where it's</u> <u>easy to live sustainably</u>

Readers may be wondering what has

happened to G-UP's flagship project of managing Ugborough burial ground's rough grassland area for wildlife...

Over the spring and summer, members of the Wildlife and Biodiversity group surveyed the site and developed a bespoke management proposal in collaboration with an ecologist, with the following elements aimed at maximizing biodiversity.

We presented this proposal (see below) to the Parish Council in August. Following discussions, we've not yet been able to agree on a management plan that both parties are happy to move forward with, so management of the site remains with the Parish Council.

Greener Ugborough Parish Burial Ground Management Proposal

- 1. Mowing different areas with different frequency to create micro-habitats. Areas of rough grassland would be mown every other year to develop a thatch that would shelter small mammals, and reptiles, feeding predators like the tawny owl caught on camera via the G-UP Wildlife Group. This will also provide an excellent habitat for hedgehogs, an IUCN red list species; as well as overwintering and nesting habitats for many insects such as bumblebees, beetles, and moths. An area already rich in wildflowers would be mown twice a year to encourage more wildflowers, extending the flowering season for pollinators.
- 2. Reducing the cutting frequency of one (non-roadside) hedge to reduce invasive bracken growth and improve wildlife habitat.
- 3. Introduction of rotten wood piles (hidden under trees), compost heap and reptile refuge would help increase the area's biodiversity.
- 4. Removing weeds such as bracken that would otherwise dominate.
- 5. Cutting paths through the managed area so that users of the burial ground could enjoy the space and using small signs to explain the mowing regime.
- Recruiting volunteers to help with this work, to increase public engagement and awareness, and to encourage people to do similar projects on their private land and gardens.
- 7. Surveying flora and fauna regularly to measure the impact of the management changes

A huge amount of learning has been achieved over the 6 months spent considering the site and we'd like to thank everyone involved for their hard work and contribution. It is clear that this is a very special site – both to us as visitors for whom the site is so dear, but also to our local wildlife which inhabits it and contributes to its peace and beauty.

The Parish Council have said they would welcome community input and so we are hoping to input what we have learned to the management plan that the Parish Council will continue to coordinate. We are hoping that this will help respond to the Climate and Biodiversity Emergency declared by our Parish and District Councils.

## Hedgehog News - Susan Williams

Here are some Do's and Don'ts to protect hedgehogs in your garden

- Do check or move your bonfire before you light it to see if a hedgehog or other wild animal has moved in.
- Do leave some areas of wilderness where the hedgehogs can snuffle for insects.
- Do put out water for drinking.
- Do put out a bowl of dog food or meaty cat food around dusk.
- Do check areas for hedgehogs before strimming
- Don't put out bread and milk or mealworms
- Don't pick up fit hedgehogs
- Don't use slug pellets or other chemicals, they may poison hedgehogs and other animals.
- Don't fork over compost heaps in case hedgehogs or other animals have taken up residence.

#### **Ugborough Steepers under way!** - Graham Gilbert

On a lovely Sunday morning in October, Ugborough Steepers, our community hedge laying group, commenced work on a hedge along Northways Lane that forms the southern boundary of Broadens Field. We were guided on our way by three friends from South Brent Steepers who kindly gave up their day's work at Penstave Copse to be with us. They also very kindly donated some equipment, loppers, bow saws, etc., to us.

After a brief talk on the health and safety aspects of hedge laying and an overview of the tools used, the practical work got underway. We were working on a typical Devon hedgebank, the hedge part consisting of an outer row of hazel (facing the lane) and an inner row of mostly blackthorn and hawthorn which provides the stock-proof element.

We began by clearing away unwanted growth at the base of and on the sides of the bank. This gave us cleared access to the hazel and thorn which then had to be thinned by about 50% before it could be laid.

After a leisurely lunch break, with Western Beacon providing the backdrop, we enjoyed a couple more hours graft before ending the session quite pleased with what we had achieved at around 3 p.m. We learned a lot, had good company, and the weather was exceedingly kind to us. What more could you ask for?

#### **Harvest Festival**





#### Beryl's Bookworms – Jane Johns

The book we read during September for discussion at the beginning of October was The Dutch House by Ann Patchett.

It tells the story of a brother and sister growing up in a modern mansion in Pennsylvania, their mother disappeared shortly after Danny's birth, and he is brought up by a combination of his older sister, Maeve, and a small clutch of family retainers. The father, though physically present, is a shadowy figure for most of the time, although wealthy through the ownership of many properties, which he rents out to businesses and individuals. Enter the evil stepmother and her two daughters. (Sounds like Cinderella! Some of the reviews even likened it to a fairy-tale) Danny and Maeve seem unable and unwilling to put the past behind them and frequently visit the house to sit outside in Maeve's car in the road. Nothing much happens, and it does become somewhat tedious! History appears to repeat itself with Danny marrying out of convenience, and collecting real estate like his father, having unwillingly trained to be a doctor, a vocation that he is determined not to pursue. The book was guite well-written and an easy read, but we all felt it was lacking in conviction, the characters failed to grab our attention and the plot was all over the place! Despite glowing reviews inside the cover of the book and online, we were not convinced, and gave it a score of 2.75 overall (out of 5) However, as so often happens with a book that no-one really likes, it did provoke lively discussion which diverged into issues raised by the book. Most of us would not readily recommend it.

Your Stars Tonight. It is a long time since we last had a Ugborough History Society visit to Ugborough's fabled silver-lead mine, which just squeezes into Ugborough Parish at the bottom of the hill near Filham. It was very much a boom-and-bust enterprise which went pop in 1869 having expended most of its efforts at removing money from gullible investors, rather than lead ore from the ground – take your pick from today's stock market and spot the difference.

I was reminded of our own little mine at the beginning of October when I went on a Welsh Mines Society excursion looking at the industrial archaeology of the empty highlands of Mid Wales. Located in the Cambrian Mountains and with the nearest towns being Llangurig, Llanidloes and Machynlleth – none of which are popular go-to destinations for most of us. The Dylife Lead Mines have an ancient history, probably going back to the Bronze Age, and in the 1850's was one of the largest lead mines in Britain. It was, like the Cornish Tin Mines, an early victim of globalisation and finally closed in the 1930's unable to compete with cheap imports from America and Asia.

All that remains now are numerous vast caverns, pits and open cast workings with the ruins of numerous wheel pits. It is sobering to look at the five or so holiday homes and farm buildings that are now scattered over the vast area and realise that 1000 miners and their families toiled there only 150 years ago — only a graveyard remains. We walked to the top of the hill — locally known as Gallows Hill — a gibbet was found there a few years ago — evidence of the failed crime prevention policies of previous generations. The gloomy spot welcomed us with weather that was highly reminiscent of Central Dartmoor — drenching rain and a howling gale.

Our objective was marked on the map as a "Roman fortlet" and as the visibility dropped to Hound of the Baskerville levels, we eventually found its faint outline in the turf. What on earth had the driven the Romans to build a fort there? For the same reason that brought the Victorian miners – the lead ore. As we peered across the desolate moorland in the driving rain I imagined a Roman soldier, perhaps recruited from Anatolia or Levant, plaintively asking the same question – only to be fobbed off by their superior that it was all about "defending the plumbing industry's global supply chain from disruption by the local restless natives" – not much has changed there either!

And in the middle of the night, listening to a choir of Welsh wolves, perhaps the Roman soldier would appreciate the fact that Dylife must have been a prime Dark Skies location – when it was not raining. Perhaps he would follow the passage of the planets across the night sky as a way of counting off the weeks and months before he was transferred to somewhere else – anywhere else - in the Roman Empire.

For those of us who will be getting up early in November 2021 there could be some wonderful sights just before sunrise – from the second until the fourth of the month there will be Mercury contrasting to a pale waning crescent Moon and by the fourth the Moon will have shrunk to a hardly visible crescent which will test your eyesight. And if it is not raining on 19<sup>th</sup> November, watch out for an early morning partial eclipse of the Moon as it drops towards the horizon just after 7 a.m. And for those of us who don't do early mornings (count me in) then Venus will be greeting our loss of British Summer time by putting on a dazzling display every evening (weather permitting) and sharing the western horizon with the fast-fading Jupiter and Saturn.

**The October meeting** started with exciting news on Ugborough & Bittaford Preschool's plans for a **purpose-built preschool building** on the school site. I am sure many of you know the difficulties faced by the preschool's use of the village hall, including inadequate storage and poor access to outside space. The plans include more effective storage, administration and kitchen facilities, purpose built changing areas and more toilet facilities. This would enable the preschool to open for extended hours, particularly in the summer months.

The proposed preschool/after school club has received support from the school and already negotiations are proceeding with a local builder, surveyor and architect in the hope that the building may be completed by the summer 2022 holiday club. The Parish Council has asked for financial details so that it can contribute towards the costs.

The community use of the school field could potentially be scuppered even before negotiations have started – and the problem is dog poo. Somehow, dogs are accessing the school field and leaving their mess, which is a serious health hazard for children using the field. Obviously, this has to stop before the community use of the school field can even be considered.

The unkempt state of the churchyard was one of the items raised by the public. Apart from upsetting relatives visiting graves, the state of the churchyard has become a health & safety issue — and an embarrassment to the village. SHDC is responsible for maintaining the churchyard, and District Councillor Holway has reminded them of their obligations.

One planning application (with the Parish Council recommendation in bold): 3507/21/FUL Change of use of land from storage to lorry parking in association with Ivybridge Waste Transfer Station at Land at SX 633555 Ermington Road, Ivybridge Neutral. A Travel Plan was needed to ensure unnecessary trips through residential areas to reach destinations were avoided.

**The 2020/21 Audit** has been completed, with no '...matters giving cause for concern...' and can be viewed on the Parish Council <u>website</u>. In addition, the Parish Council reviewed its mid-term budget, which also gave no cause for concern.

**Highways & Rights of Way** matters included filling potholes along Donkey Lane, which had become hazardous, financed by the Parish Paths Partnership fund.

Complaints had been received about the serious subsidence on Whitehouse Lane and on the lane from Hillhead to Little Bittaford. I have previously submitted complaints to DCC Highways, so hopefully they will do something about it this time.

Over the last 4 years, we have been sharing a vehicle activated speed sign with Yealmpton Parish Council, which we have displayed in Bittaford and Wrangaton to keep speeds down. Collecting and erecting the speed sign at regular intervals has been a burden on your Parish Councillors and now the sign is beginning to show its age. So the Parish Council intends to get its own solar powered speed sign and is asking for financial help from the SHDC and DCC Locality Funds.

The festive, fun 2k course is suitable for all ages and abilities and there will be plenty of festive treats and surprises to enjoy along the way.


