



Romeo and Julie

The art in Ugborough seems to be diversifying with this first 'amdram' production by the Youth Group under the guiding eye of 'Cecil B deNellie Dadge'. Choosing to remake a classic requires innovation and something special, but gladly this was provided in abundance by the enthusiastic cast and some clever production quirks. Choosing to make it a musical, based on the style (and music) of Mama Mia, was a real surprise, but then so were the fantastic performances.

Jemima looked born to play the female lead and looked stunning in the role, but she also brought a humour that surely only comes from knowing what it is like to be a teenager at home. Definitely not born for the part (I hope) was Immy in the male lead, but she thoroughly enjoyed her opportunity to frolic as a young man in love and to throw 2 of the characters down the ingenious bottomless water well.

In support, we had the scene stealing Freddy as Friar Lorenzo, able to make dusting a cross into classic comedy; the hugely talented Charlotte as a portly Lord Capulet with great charisma; Josie looking surprisingly comfortable in the role of the partying Lady Capulet; Emma as the lively Tibault, even after

death; Ellie as the shallow Paris ("I know I am desperate, but I couldn't marry a dead girl") and Thalia in the role of a lustful nanny.

Many other superb supporting performances helped to make it a tremendously successful first outing, ably produced by Jane and Tessa, with technical support from Jake and a small team of parents, who were very brave to endure the 'artistic' temperaments that such a big effort must have induced. 

CEREMONY AT UGBOROUGH CHURCH

With a royal wedding in April in people's minds, it seems a good idea to use the April Newsletter to write about the wedding of the year Ugborough style 1939.

The number of guests at William & Catherine's wedding will be approximately 2000 but the Ugborough wedding which caught the attention of the South Devon Times, was a figure which actually caused the newspaper to publish not only a photo of the bride and groom on the steps of the church, but also a photo annotated "A picture taken from Ugborough Churchyard showing the cars parked by some of the 400 guests who attended the wedding of Miss Joan Hutchison and Mr. Charles Blundell."

Unfortunately it cannot be reproduced here but it showed that the square was not set out with guidelines for parking. Cars were parked along both sides and up the hill towards the school and there were two further lines of cars, one went from in front of the war memorial to the conduit and the other at a strange angle from the corner of Donkey Lane towards the old bakery.

For those who may find interest in the content of wedding reports from seventy years ago, the information included:-

Massed groups of lilies, tulips, irises and daffodils decorated Ugborough Church on Saturday, for the wedding of Miss Joan Hutchison and Mr Charles Blundell. The bride is the elder daughter of Mrs Hutchison, of the Quillet, Wrangaton, South Brent and the late Admiral John de Mestre Hutchison. Owing to the recent death of the bridegroom's father, there were no bridesmaids at the ceremony. The bride was given away by her mother, but entered the church on the arm of her uncle, Commander R A Yonge, R.N. She wore a close-fitting gown of cream slipper satin with a draped bodice and the

skirt falling into a train. Her bouquet consisted of orchids, lilies, tulips and freesias and she wore a headdress of orchids and lilies to match.

The bride's mother chose a two-piece suit in two shades of turquoise with a multi-coloured straw hat to tone. A black crepe dress, with a black ostrich feather hat and mink cape was worn by the bridegroom's mother.

The service was conducted by Canon F R Carr and the Rev. C S de Cerjat. Mrs Cerjat was at the organ and Mrs Rawlings was responsible for the church decoration. After the ceremony a reception was held at the Quillet and later Mr & Mrs Charles Blundell left for their honeymoon, to be spent in the Scilly Isles, the bride wearing a two-piece suit of lichen green with pill-box hat to match and silver fox-fur.

'CHERNOBYL 25' CONCERT

This year is the twenty fifth anniversary of the nuclear disaster at Chernobyl. As part of a Europe-wide campaign to mark the tragedy and to remind the world that it will forever haunt the children of Belarus and Ukraine who grow up in the contaminated environment that is the legacy of the largest radioactive fallout in living memory, the Totnes & South Hams link of the national charity Chernobyl Children's Lifeline is holding a CONCERT in St Petroc's Church SOUTH BRENT on MONDAY 25^{TH} APRIL, the eve of the disaster 25 years ago.

We shall have a group of 8 Ukrainian children with us and they will join groups of local musicians in singing traditional songs and helping to light 25 commemorative candles. The concert will begin at 7.30 pm and the candle-lighting will take place at 8pm. Similar ceremonies will be taking place all over the UK and mainland Europe at venues such as Trafalgar Square, the Eiffel Tower and the Brandenburg Gate.

PLEASE COME AND SUPPORT US. It costs £350 to bring each child over from Belarus and Ukraine, as we have to pay for visa fees and all travel costs, including air fares. Tickets for the concert are £5 each and can be obtained from Pickles Store Modbury, the Watermark Ivybridge and the Mare and Foal Sanctuary South Brent.

<u>The Police</u> continued to highlight the disturbing increase in thefts of metal in the area and asked parishioners to be vigilant and report to the police any suspicious activity - thefts include galvanised farm gates, lead flashing and catalytic convertors from parked vehicles. Following complaints that garages had been obstructed in Seldons Close, the Police have contacted all the residents, asking for consideration when parking and the Clerk has suggested to Tor Homes that they investigate the provision of additional parking.

Important changes to Housing Benefit come into force from April, with the rate of Local Housing Allowance being capped and the Housing Benefit excess removed - details are available in two leaflets published by SHDC: 'Housing Benefit' and 'Do you or your partner have a carer who stays overnight in your home'. Where an additional bedroom is needed for an overnight carer, then you may be eligible for Housing Benefit on that room. To obtain these leaflets, call 01803 861234 or email services@southhams.gov.uk.Devon County Council has also been producing leaflets: 'Social Care for Adults', which contains information on personal budgets and the 'Putting People First' programme to give people more choice and control over the support they receive. Further details on the programme are given in the 'Personal Budgets Factsheet' (FS7). Both publications are available from Care Direct 0845 1551 007.

Future housing development in Ugborough will be discussed at our Annual Parish Meeting, to be held at Ugborough Village Hall on Wednesday 6th April from 7.30pm. This is your

opportunity as parishioners to raise issues which affect you. Representatives from the Police, Dartmoor National Park Authority, Devon County Council and South Hams District Council will be there - so come along and let your voice be heard!

The proposed Ugborough Community Open Space was considered at the meeting, following informal discussions with the National Trust. The most suitable plot would be the $\frac{1}{2}$ -1 acre site adjacent to the A3121 at the entrance to Ugborough. Parishioners' feedback on the proposal will be sought at the Annual Parish Meeting.

<u>Planning Applications</u> No objections were raised to the barn at 3 Leigh Close, Bittaford; the amendments to the Listed Building Consent at Dairy Loft, Ware Farm, Ugborough; or the agricultural building at Mammoth Trees, Wrangaton Road, South Brent. An appeal has been submitted against the refusal of outline planning permission for a detached dwelling at land off Shute Lane, Wrangaton, and the Parish Council has reiterated its support for the planning application on the grounds that it would not be detrimental to the character or appearance of the area and would provide an affordable home for a local family.

The Sustainable Communities Act has given Parish Councils and local groups the opportunity to submit ideas on how their community can work more sustainably. The Parish Council has taken the opportunity to question whether the Dartmoor National Park Authority is fit to be a planning authority, as it is unrepresentative and unresponsive to the needs of local businesses and communities – resulting in decisions, such as the refusal of the proposed dwelling at Shute Lane (see above). The Parish Council has also suggested that the Bus Pass should be available at all times for a charge of £1 per trip and be extended to include under 18 year olds. It will be interesting to see if anything comes of these suggestions.

<u>Repair work</u> has started on the conduit in Ugborough Square, thanks in part to the generosity of South Hams and Devon County Councils. The Parish Council has also had to undertake emergency repairs to the Burial Ground hedge bank, which had crumbled into the lane.

<u>Parish and District Council elections</u> – a reminder that the elections are to be held in May this year. Nominations must be submitted by noon on Monday 4th April, with the election being held on Thursday 5^{th} May.

If you wish to become a Parish Councillor or a District Councillor, please call the Electoral Administrator on 01803 861129 and ask for a nomination form. The next Meeting will be the Annual Parish Meeting on Wednesday 6th April from 7.30pm in Ugborough Village Hall - the meeting for the whole community, with refreshments provided. The normal Parish Council Meeting will be held on Thursday 14th April from 7.30pm.

St Peter's Church, Ugborough Revd John Ough, Rector and Priest in Charge Dear friends,

Our churches are on a journey into the unknown and this can be a frightening feeling. Abraham was called to leave the familiar and go into the unknown. Lot journeyed with Abraham, however they decided to part when their herdsmen began to quarrel, Abraham taking the right hand path, Lot the left. Lot's family ends up in Sodom and escapes just before the Lord destroyed the city because of its sin. They are told not to look back as the city is destroyed but, as I am sure you know, Lot's wife looks back and is turned into a pillar of salt. Jesus also tells us that no one who puts his hand to the plough and looks back is fit for service in the Kingdom of Heaven (Luke 9:62). The Lord calls us on a pilgrimage into the unknown - we must not look back - we must walk the walk of faith.

The Diocese of Exeter had a vision through its Bishop and Synod, of Mission Communities being set up throughout Devon. The reason for this was that very few Churches had the resources to be fully functioning Mission Communities - paying and housing full time clergy - working with the young - the old - with parents, and giving the width and depth of worship to satisfy all traditions. Rather it was in coming together that this could be resourced. We are now making strides as we, the Three Rivers Mission Community, step out in faith. The Rev'd Harry Jevons has now been appointed as my Assistant within the entire Three Rivers Mission Community, together with Rev'd

Caroline. Both of them are House for Duty Clergy, working two days per week plus the Sunday services). I remain Priest in Charge and Rector, serving all seven churches. In addition we have our friends Preb. Philip Luff, Rev'd Dr Peter Povey, and, to be fully Licensed in the autumn, Dr David Stafford, our home grown reader. In addition to all this we are fortunate to have laity, who ably serve in many capacities. Each person brings different strengths and qualities to the Mission Community as a whole and helps to create a rich diversity that will help us to fully engage as the people of God within our villages in the 21^{st} century.

The vision of the church must now be to the future. Yes, we continue to give thanks for the past, but the future beckons us forward in faith and love. We have as a Mission Community taken up the call from our Bishop Michael to try to grow our churches by 25%. This is the call which confronts all church members and comes from Christ Himself. May the churches in this Mission Community continue to reflect this love of God, drawing others in by the power of this love and witness.

I pray that our Mission Community might reflect a net work of love and that strong links may be forged across the villages. I had a baptism of a farmer's daughter one Sunday at Halwell. After Sunday lunch I lay back on the sofa and only when the phone rang did I realise that I had completely forgotten, for the first time in thirteen years, that I should be at a service. Well, the Motorway between Diptford and Halwell had reports of a speeding car & 15 minutes later the service began. The next day I had a farmer's funeral at Ermington. To my surprise I was greeted by a constant stream of "good to see you made it on time, vicar". All said with dead pan faces! This is part of what it means to belong to a community that is linked across the villages. We can build up a network of love across our parishes – using the strengths of others in order to complement and grow our individual churches. This will take time, and it will not be easy. We will need to start to think beyond our own parish and journey as Abraham did and as Jesus did, with the love of God in our hearts.

Bishop John has agreed to come to the Mission Community on 21st August to celebrate the formation of this new community; to pray God's blessing on our seven Churches; to commend the Ministry Team to God and to License Revd Harry and Revd Caroline. We look forward to this special event and we go forward on our Christian journey in faith, as Abraham did, not looking back, as did Lot's wife, but looking positively to the future, with all its challenges, in God's name.

Confirmation

This year's Deanery Confirmation will be on June 5th at 6.00 p.m., in Dartmouth - probably at St. Clement's.

We have already started some preparation with 4 boys from the Mission Community and wonder whether there are any other adults or young people who would be interested in exploring this step for themselves.
